Sound It Out, Brother Wolf is a reader and a story book in one whimsical book. This is the third book in the *Sound It Out* series. The *Sound It Out* books are dual readers.

Each book contains two portions of text for each two-page spread/picture. One text is written at a new reader level. On the opposite page there is text written at an upper level (that an older student can read or that a parent/teacher can read to a younger child). These readers literally grow with your child's reading skills!

Sound It Out, Brother Wolf is a reader and a story book in one whimsical book and is based on one of Mowgli's "wolf brothers." The student text is vocabulary-controlled for new readers to be able to read silently or orally.

The pictures are delightful, and the text is engaging for children of all ages.

He went to the village to live with humans.

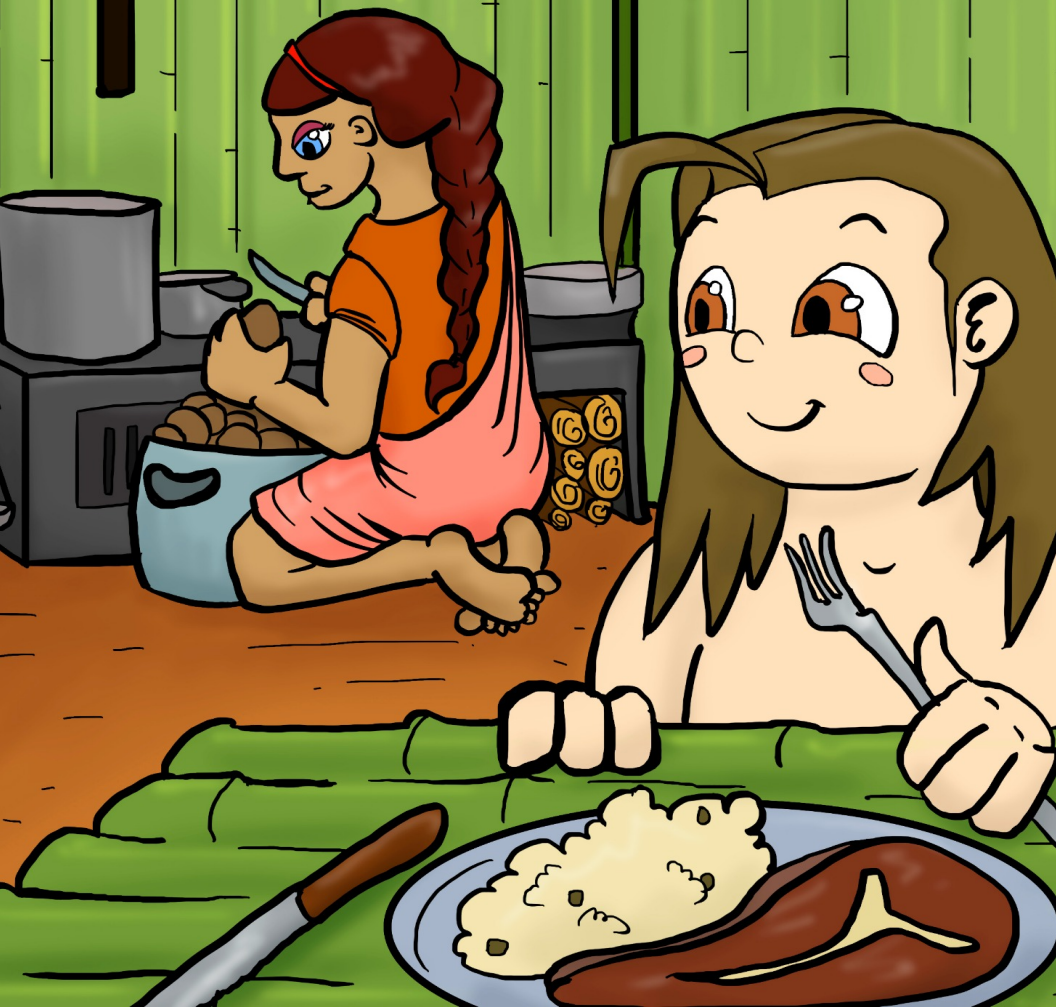
When Mowgli reached the human village, the people stared and pointed. Some whispered about this strange human.

Mowgli went to her hut and ate. It looked like a prison to him, but he decided to stay and try to learn the human language and ways.





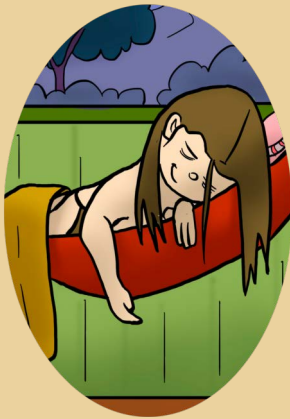
In the village, a woman helped him.

Mowgli agreed. He loved the jungle. It was his home.

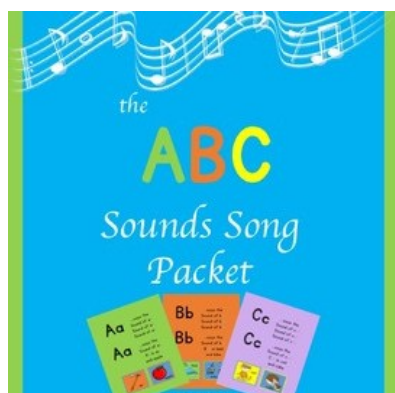
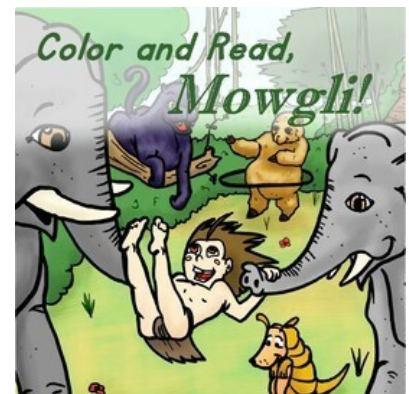
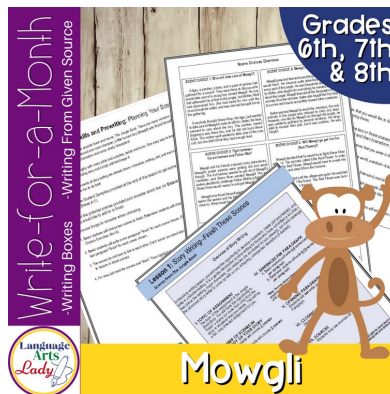
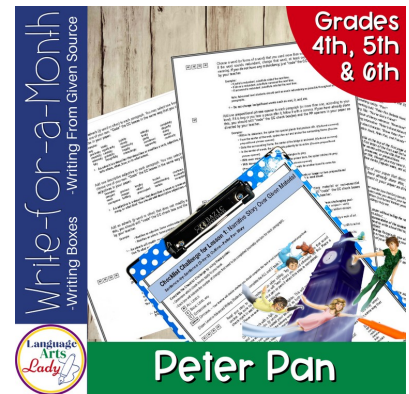
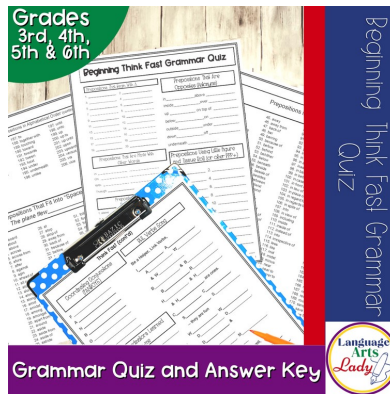
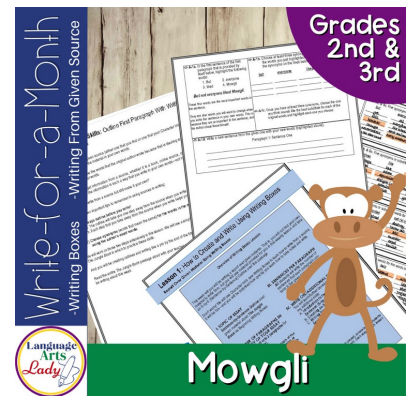
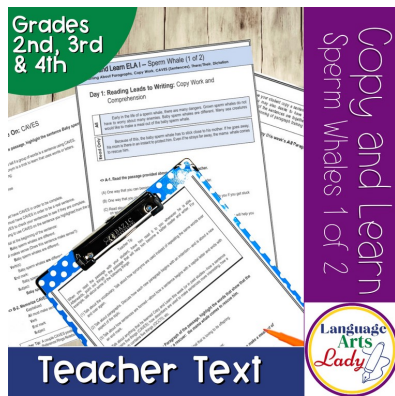
